Disc prolapses are also called 'herniated', 'slipped', 'bulging' or 'ruptured' discs. It is estimated that about 55% of the population aged over 60 years old and about 20% of people under 60 have at least one prolapsed disc – however of these people, about 15% of those under 40 years are pain-free and have no symptoms and this is increased to almost 30% in people over 40 years old. Lumbar Disc Prolapse - Spines Dorset Manual therapy treatment: Manual treatment cannot directly heal a pathologic disc. Instead, manual treatment should be directed at decreasing the stress factors that can aggravate or perpetuate a pathologic disc. Soft tissue manipulation should be done to relieve any unnecessary compression due to spasming of the nearby paraspinal musculature. How do we treat a pathologic disc with manual therapy? Physical therapy is often recommended for prolapsed discs. It may seem counterintuitive, but in reality, it is perhaps one of the most effective ways to deal with a prolapsed disc. Not just any exercises will do, though. It's important to work closely with a doctor to ensure that further damage isn't done to the disc. Prolapsed Disc Treatment and Recovery: A Surgeon's Advice There are a number of possible treatments for a prolapsed disc. Your treatment will depend on the severity of your condition. In the majority of cases, a slipped disc will heal on its own. Your

treatment might simply consist of rest, with exercises such as swimming thrown in to keep you active. It usually gets better slowly with rest, gentle exercise and painkillers. Check if it's a slipped disc Slipped disc - NHS A prolapsed, or 'slipped disc' occurs when a disc in the lower back compresses a nerve causing pain. The vertebrae in the spine have discs of tissue that sit between them. The discs are located next to the nerves in the spine so when a disc becomes damaged it compresses on the nerves, causing pain. The central portion of the lumbar disc (nucleus pulposus) bulges through the surrounding fibrous tissue (annulus fibrosis) and may cause irritation or compression of an adjacent nerve. A prolapsed or herniated disc refers to the displacement of disc material beyond the intervertebral disc space. Both conditions can provoke similar symptoms, however a prolapsed disc occurs when the nucleus of the spinal disc bulges or prolapses outwards but remains contained within the annulus fibrosis. What happens is that part of the inner softer part of the disc (the nucleus pulposus) bulges out (herniates) through a weakness in the outer part of the disc. A prolapsed disc is sometimes called a herniated disc. Prolapsed Disc (Slipped Disc) | Symptoms and Treatment ... Causes of a Prolapsed Disc A prolapsed disc is often described as a “slipped disc” a “herniated disc” or a “ruptured disc”. Spinal injury may cause a disc prolapse, but the most common cause is wear and tear, or disc degeneration. Disc degeneration starts as small cracks in the annulus or outer rings of the disc.

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
